2018 LABOR-OPPOSED BILLS

Assembly Bills

AB 1759 (McCarty): Would politicize critical road infrastructure projects by stripping funding from cities to punish them for not meeting unrelated state requirements.

AB 2011 (Kiley): Would exempt charter schools from geographical restrictions that apply to all other public schools.

AB 2016 (Fong): Would make it harder for workers to enforce basic labor rights under the Private Attorneys General Act (PAGA).

AB 2067 (Gallagher): Would require school districts to hire or contract out for at least one armed security guard.

AB 2223 (Flora): Would change current law so workers could only get a wage notice monthly instead of semimonthly or at the time wages are issued.

AB 2386 (Rubio): Would require that Occupational and Physical Therapists employed by schools get a new credential, making many existing employees ineligible for their jobs.

AB 2482 (Voepel/Baker): Would allow the employer to talk workers into waiving their eight-hour day and going to an alternative workweek schedule without the existing protections from employer pressure and retaliation.

AB 2484 (Voepel): Would allow employers to stop paying overtime and instead provide comp time.

AB 2530 (Melendez): Would prohibits the High-Speed Rail Authority from selling any further bonds for construction of high speed rail projects and re-direct that funding.

AB 2715 (Limon): Would allow employers to consider arrests or detentions that did not result in a conviction when making employment decisions about non-sworn employees of a law enforcement agency.

AB 2725 (Acosta): Would expand the work performed by the California Conservation Corps to include housing projects, taking away opportunities from apprentices and construction workers to earn a decent living and increasing profits for wealthy developers.

AB 2742 (Allen): Would suppress the vote by requiring voters to present photo identification at polling sites.

AB 2770 (Irwin): Would protect an employer who makes false statements about whether a former employee engaged in sexual harassment.

AB 2827 (Allen): Would repeal immigrant worker protections against the threats of immigration worksite raids.

AB 2882 (Harper): Would reduce the small contributions a union member can make to a union's PAC committee.

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AB 2931 (Patterson): Would require additional cooperation between local law enforcement and federal immigration enforcement.

AB 2946 (Allen): Would allow local law enforcement to share data with federal immigration enforcement.

AB 2996 (Fong): Would allow Job Order Contracting on transportation projects but fails to incorporate important labor protections.

AB 3093 & 3094 (Patterson): Would change labor relations law for farmworkers to make it harder to join or maintain a union.

ACA 15 (Brough): Prohibits a public agency from improving employee benefits without going to a vote.

Senate Bills

SB 1031 (Moorlach): Would restrict a pension system from giving cost-of-living increases for retirees.

SB 1032 (Moorlach): Would allow a public agency to terminate its contract with CalPERS without fully funding its liabilities.

SB 1049 (Moorlach): Would repeal the law that withholds state construction funding from a charter city if it bans consideration of a project labor agreement.

SB 1149 (Glazer): Would make significant changes to pension law that unfairly shift increased risk to workers and negatively impact the long-term viability of defined benefit plans.
